## Code of ethics and good practices for lac de l'Orignal

Lac de l'Orignal is a popular destination for vacationers due to its proximity to the city and quality of its water. To preserve the lake, it is essential that lakeside owners, boaters and other users adopt environmentally respectful behaviours because water is a collective heritage and it is our obligation to protect it.

Rivers and lakes are rich ecosystems where life abounds. Water is vital to the survival of all species and many, (such as fish, amphibians, insects, and certain mammals), depend directly on a healthy aquatic ecosystem to survive. These environments are also shared with vacationers and users who look to benefit from the wonderful resources they have to offer. However, the balance between occupants and users of bodies of water is often weakened by inappropriate behaviours.

## Why a code of ethics?

To frame water-based activities, the goal of this code of ethics is to agree upon sound practices that are respectful of the environment and of other users of the body of water. Our lake's health is proportional to the commitment that each of us is willing to offer. The aim of this code is to raise our awareness of potentially harmful activities as well as behaviours to adopt for a better quality of life. Therefore, the code exists and we encourage you to share it with your visitors, renters, and those to whom you lend your cottage.

## **Protecting Water Quality**



According to water quality analysis parameters, lakes are classified based on their eutrophication level. This is the natural aging phenomenon of lakes and waterways and can be accelerated by human activity. To slow the eutrophication process of lakes and waterways, **it is important to:** 

- Empty your septic tank as required by municipal bylaw, (every two years for permanent residents, and every four years for seasonal residents, or as required if sooner);
- Avoid soaps and products that contain phosphorus / phosphates in favor of biodegradable and eco-friendly products;
- Wash your watercraft and trailer before putting them in the water. Beware of the spreading of exotic invasive species; there is a free washing station at the Val-des-Bois city hall.



- When filling the gas tank, avoid overflow and spillage of any pollutant into the water (e.g., gas, oil);
- Electric motors and four-stroke engines for your boat are preferred (cleaner technology);
- Do not throw garbage into the water;

### Limit noise, and garbage



Sounds are a source of noise pollution when too loud. Noise disrupts the calm and peaceful environment that many waterside residents and vacationers look for. While performing your various activities, it is important to:

- Respect the area's natural sounds and the quality of life of your neighbours by avoiding unnecessary noises and music that is excessively loud;
- Favour guiet or electric boat motors;

- Avoid unnecessary and repetitive noises while on your watercraft (tight turns, wave jumping, acrobatics, overtaking, splashing maneuvers);
- Use your warning systems (sirens and horns) in emergencies only;
- Keep your property clean and free of all garbage accumulation.

### Reduce watercraft speeds



All watercrafts must travel at speeds that ensure the safety of its passengers and other users of the body of water as well as limit their impact on the environment, which occurs, among other ways by generating waves that erode shorelines. When using your watercraft, **it is important to:** 

- Navigate counter clockwise: drivers of motorised watercraft must travel with the closest shore of the body of water ON THEIR RIGHT;
- Navigate at lower speeds (less than 10 km/h) when less than 30 metres from shore;
- Reduce the watercraft's speed, particularly when arriving or departing shore;
- · Arriving or departing perpendicular to the shore is preferred;
- Reduce speeds in bays;
- Turn the motor off when in water that is less than 1 metre deep;
- Operate your watercraft in a way that respects other users and the environment (careful for waves, capsizing, encirclements, spills, etc.);
- Use watercraft with shallow draft et spread the weight in the vessel;
- Navigate in deep waters when using seadoos, wake boats, big boats, and rapid watercraft.

## Favour good behaviour!

To respect others, we must all adopt healthy practices. On board your watercraft, **it is important to:** 

- Allow priority passage for swimmers and non-motorised watercraft;
- Travel as far as possible (at least 50 metres) from swimmers, those fishing, and nonmotorised watercraft;
- Adjust your driving to the level of lake activity. Be courteous and prudent;
- Avoid aggressive, uncontrolled driving;
- Make sure your watercraft is in good condition and has all the required safety equipment;
- Respect safe boating rules;
- Have your pleasure craft operator's permit;

**IMPORTANT:** This code of ethics does not replace the laws and regulations related to watercraft and water safety. It is conceived to promote and inspire behaviours that are harmonious with the environment and other users of our lakes and rivers.
